District C's Senior Center Project Update

While dining at a restaurant, Dr. Bob Pinson noticed several senior citizens passing a pair of eyeglasses around in order to be able to read the menu. This led to the idea to find a way to help senior citizens meet their eyeglass needs.



We now have an eyeglass rack at the Lacey Senior Center. The rack holds 36 pairs of glasses in a variety of strengths from +1 to +4.5. Each week we take an inventory of all the glasses on the rack and then replace those that have been taken. The most needed strengths are the +2.5 and above.

We do not charge for these glasses, but do request that the seniors sign a log for each pair of glasses taken. When the program began back in December, 20 or more pairs of glasses were provided to the seniors weekly. It appears that it is now leveling off to 10-15 per week.

It is very gratifying to go into the Senior Center and to be thanked by several people on each visit. Once, while I was servicing the rack, a lady came up to the counter to ask if she could borrow a pair so that she could play cards that day, "I left my glasses home and I need a pair to be able to play".
